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Overview

The African Nova Scotian History Challenges recognize students whose submissions best exemplify the contributions of African Nova Scotians to the history, heritage, and culture of Nova Scotia. Online form registration is mandatory for all entries.

- **Eligibility:** The Challenges are open to all students from grades primary through 12 within Nova Scotia.
- Age Groups: Contests are categorized and judged by grade levels.
 Participants must enter in the category that corresponds to their current grade.

Entry Categories:

- Group (2-6 Members): Groups must consist of 2-6 students collaborating on a single project.
- Class Entries: Submitted by the teacher, representing the collective effort of the entire class.
- Single Entries: For individual participants working alone on their project.

Online Submission:

- ALL participants must submit an online registration form.
 (Physical submissions, if applicable, must follow additional guidelines, see below.)
- Acceptable Digital File Formats: JPEG, PNG (images); MP3, WAV (audio); MP4, MOV (video); DOC, DOCX, Shared link (Google Drive); PDF (written documents).

Physical Submissions:

- 1. Attach the Entry Form: Print and firmly attach the physical entry form to your project.
- 2. **Reference Number:** Include the unique reference number generated by online registration.
- 3. **Photograph Your Project:** Take a clear, well-lit photo of your project, showing the entire project and the attached entry form. Upload this photo with your online submission.

Award Ceremony & Prize Distribution:

- Notifications will be sent via email for award announcements and ceremony details.
- Prizes vary by entry category, including monetary awards, prize packs, and swag.

Project Return and Retention:

- Return Requests: Clearly mark physical submissions for return and include prepaid postage.
- **Retention Period:** Physical projects held for two weeks post-awards Ceremony.
- **Unclaimed Projects:** Unclaimed projects without prepaid postage will be disposed of after May 17.

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Breaking News!


SCOPE: Group (2-6), or Individual submissions

FORMAT: Video (3-5 Minutes in length)

DETAILS: You are the reporting team sent to cover breaking news. Produce and submit a video news report, 3 to 5 minutes long, about one of the following significant historical events. Be sure to cover the basic reporter's questions of who, what, where, when, and why. Why is the event significant? What is the aftermath? If working in a group, include interviews and eye-witness accounts with your report.





City officials threaten to have **Eddie Carvery** arrested when he sets up his protest camp at Africville. Despite the threat, he begins the longest continuous protest in Canadian history.




Residents of East Preston, North Preston, Cherry Brook, and Lake Loon are fighting to receive clear titles to their land. This issue dates back to the 18th century, when Black settlers arrived in Nova Scotia and were not given legal title to their land. **Angela Simmonds** and other community members work together to change this 200-year-old historical injustice.




African Nova Scotian Communities

SCOPE: Open to Class, Group (2-6 members), or Individual submissions.

FORMAT: Vlog, Board Game, Card Game, or Scavenger Hunt.

DETAILS: Choose a Black community or settlement in Nova Scotia and develop a captivating travel game or create an informative vlog (video blog) to serve as a visitor's guide. Your project should effectively showcase the community's unique history, incorporating:

- Historical Facts: Uncover and present key historical details about the community.
- Landmarks: Highlight notable landmarks and their significance.
- **Prominent Figures:** Feature profiles of important individuals from the community's past and present.
- Additional Attractions: Include other points of interest that would appeal to visitors.








Notable Nova Scotians: Past and Present

SCOPE: Open to Group (2-6 members), or Individual submissions.

FORMAT: Short Essay or Video

DETAILS: African Nova Scotians have made important contributions to the political, social, and cultural life of our communities, our province, and our country. A new generation of movers and shakers have started to rise up and take the torch from those who were saying "Black Lives Matter" many decades before. Select one of the following Notable Nova Scotians and choose an individual who is continuing their work today. Write a short essay or record a video telling us how the two are similar and what they are doing to make a difference in the world today.


And the award goes to...

SCOPE: Open to Group (2-6 members), or Individual submissions.

FORMAT: Essay, Creative Project, Speech Recording, or Video Presentation.

DETAILS: This challenge celebrates the achievements of African Nova Scotians in the fields of sports, arts, and beyond. You are invited to honour a Black athlete, artist, or significant community figure – either a historical figure or someone from present day.

- **Choose a Luminary:** Select an African Nova Scotian whose contributions and achievements in their field have been noteworthy.
- Create an Award Tribute: Write an essay, prepare a speech, or create a video that would serve as an acceptance speech or tribute to this individual.
- **Highlight Their Journey**: Discuss their major accomplishments, the challenges they overcame, and their journey to success.
- Inspiring Others: Explain how this person has inspired others, including possibly yourself, and their impact on the community or field.









A Day in the Life

SCOPE: Open to Group (2-6 members), or Individual submissions. **FORMAT:**

- 1. Required Written Component: All entries must include a written component, such as a diary entry, a poem, or song lyrics
- 2. Audio or Video Component: Alongside the written work, you have the option of including an audio or video recording of the poem or song.

DETAILS: Craft a diary entry, poem, or song from the perspective of a Black Loyalist or Black Refugee in Nova Scotia. This creative work should delve into their personal experiences and emotions, exploring several key aspects such as Where did you come from? Where did you settle? What are your fears, hopes and aspirations? How did you survive? How is your life different since settling in Nova Scotia?

Alternatively, illustrate a picture depicting a day in the life of a Black Loyalist or a Black Refugee in Nova Scotia.





Express Yourself!

SCOPE: Open to Class, Group (2-6 members), or Individual submissions.

FORMAT: Open!

DETAILS: People of African descent remember and honour Africa through their language, art, music, dance, and fashions. Their influence has helped define and shape culture in North America. Submit a poem, song, illustration, dance, spoken word piece, or any other example of culture that has been influenced by people of African descent. All original entries accepted. Recorded entries must be no longer than five minutes.

SCOPE: Individual submissions only


FORMAT: Physical or digital comic booklet submission (see QR code for PDF) **REQUIREMENTS:** The provided comic activity booklet must be fully completed. The student must use only pencil, pen and colour pencils to bring drawings to life. Pages should be single-sided, with the booklet stapled together like a comic book for physical submissions or scanned in the correct page order for online submission. If you'd like to keep a copy of your work, please scan and save it before mailing it to us.

DETAILS: This exciting new challenge invites you to celebrate and express your African Nova Scotian identity and heritage in a fun comic book format titled Colouring Our Stories: Me and My ANS Communities. Through your booklet, you'll get to:

- **Highlight Significant Figures:** Learn about important African Nova Scotian figures and imagine conversations you'd have with them.
- Map Your ANS Community Roots: Chart your family's rich history with a map, exploring places and people that have shaped your heritage.
- Show Your Community Through Art: Capture the heart of your community by drawing the landmarks, people, and traditions that make it special.
- Envision a Future Shaped by ANS Influence: Imagine and write about a future influenced by African Nova Scotian culture, creativity, and leadership —what does tomorrow look like?

Introduction

These guidelines are essential for participants submitting physical entries to the African Nova Scotian History Challenges. Adherence ensures correct processing and evaluation of submissions. Please read carefully.

Preparing Your Physical Submission

Project Requirements:

- 1. Ensure your physical project meets the specific requirements outlined in the challenge description.
- 2. Projects should be durable and capable of withstanding transport without damage.
- 3. Photographing Your Project: Take a clear, well-lit photograph of your entire project. This photo must be uploaded as part of your online submission.

Completing the Physical Submission Form

Form Details:

- Accurately fill out the African Nova Scotian History Challenges physical submission form.
- The form requires your unique reference number, participant information, and your choice for project return (if applicable).

Attaching the Form:

- Print the completed form and securely attach it to your project.
- Ensure that the reference number is clearly visible on the form.
